The Science Department

Ms. Rice will be taking a group of Seniors on Friday, May 17th to release trout the class raised during the school year. The trout will be released at the Glendale Sportsman's Club in Irvona.

Mrs.Gobert received a \$2000 grant for her chemistry classroom from the Spectroscopy Society of Pittsburgh. This program provides high school teachers of biology, chemistry, physics and general science with the opportunity to request equipment/supplies valued up to \$2,000 to incorporate the use of spectroscopy and related topics in their curriculum. This equipment will be greatly appreciated and used in all of her courses. The equipment will arrive later this month from the Nasco Science Company.

The **engineering students** from Mrs. Gobert class assisted by Mr. Maneval were chosen to attend the final round of the Governor's School STEM competition. The students created a floating wetland to help with the problem of acid mine drainage. **The students involved were Jared Brink, Carissa Diehl, Brooklyn Dudurich, Madison McClellan, Meghan McClellan, Emma Spanik and Breaunna Stahl.** They worked with Dr. Tasker, an environmental engineer from Saint Francis University, for testing and research. Their project was in the top 20 out of 75 projects and they won Best in Science! We are Viking Proud!







The History Department

The 4 projects this month have been the Plains Indian Symbol "The God's Eye" known as ojos de Dios..these were done by the 11th Grade US history classes. The 1960s poster projects were completed with a partner and detailed 20 events or people who made the 1960s a decade to remember. The 1970s Music project was where the students Identified either a Peace Protest song or an Anti-war song of the 1970s and described its impact on making changes in society. The last poster is a large group timeline of the 1980s and key events and people of the 980s. these were completed by My 10th grade World History classes.
